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

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The President's Message

We have much for which we can be thankful in our Region! Every year there's a group of dedicated volunteers who spend many hours brainstorming, planning, tweaking, and executing a wonderful experience for Driver's Education Instructor Weekend and 48 Hours – both of which are offered in your back yard.

Both of these programs are an extension of our National programs. The following are highlights published by National on these programs; I thought they are beneficial for newer members and a great refresher for those of us who have been around for awhile.

Overview of our 48 Hours at Sebring race:

The basic structure of Club Racing involves a national PCA Club Racing Committee, the PCA National Office, and the Regions. The PCA National Office provides administrative support and establishes/maintains all activities associated with the national licensing of Club Racers. In addition, the National Committee includes a group of Chief Stewards, Chief Scrutineers, and National Time Techs. One, or more, of each group is assigned to each Club Race, and the assigned individuals function as the chief operating officials for that race.

Club Racing was established around several guiding principles. First, there should be a class for all Porsche sports cars,

including both street and modified cars. Second, the racing is to be fun, safe, and clean. This principle is embodied in the strict enforcement of the "13/13 Rule," which provides for immediate sanctions against any driver at fault in any incident involving car damage. Third, the organization and operation of Club Races is to be uniform, so that any racer may attend any Club Race and know exactly what to expect.

Driver Education:

The Porsche Club of America also offers an alternate on-track driving experience called Driver Education (DE). The mission and purpose of the DE Program is to provide a safe, structured, and controlled teaching and learning environment. The PCA DE Program is designed so the participant can improve his or her driving abilities and acquire a better understanding of vehicle dynamics and driving safety at various tracks around the country.

The mission and purpose of the Porsche Club of America's DE Program is to provide a safe, structured, and controlled teaching and learning environment. The PCA DE Program is designed so that participants can improve their driving abilities and acquire a better understanding of vehicle dynamics and driving safety. Participants will experience firsthand the capabilities of high-performance automobiles in a controlled, closed-course environment, and acquire skills that will enhance safer vehicle operation in all driving situations.

This adventure can become very addictive. Our instructors will teach you to drive your Porsche the way Stuttgart designed it to be driven. PCA DE schools are run in a safe and controlled environment on a closed course. Like in any new sport, your instructor will guide you into this exciting world of high performance driving. These weekends are great sources of stories. You will have dreams about various turns and wake up with memories of your instructor yelling "BRAKE" or "DON'T LIFT." These schools are truly the only safe way to learn the engineering dynamics that went into the development of this famous racing marque.

I hope to see you at Mike Kwasin's for our Wine Tasting & Dinner to benefit Ready For Life, and at Sebring the following weekend. It's also time to sign up as a volunteer for 48 Hours which will be here before you know it.

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

Replacing your Porsche's battery

Replacing a battery in modern cars has become an adventure. It used to be just unbolt the hold-down bracket and loosen the cable connectors and repeat in reverse order.

When fuel injection became standard, if the key was left on, connecting the cables usually burned out the EFI or Injection Control Unit. It wasn't long before the manufacturers built "power protection" into the control units. This helped some, but not always. Another danger was battery chargers. Most chargers "leaked" AC current that can also damage the electronics!

Fast forward to the current state of technology in

cars... now cars have as many as 40 or more control units that operate everything from the windows to monitoring the tire pressure. When you press a button on your car, you are "asking" the car to do something! If the computer that controls the function you are requesting, decides it will comply, then the function is activated, if not, you are out of luck!

So, it has become a more intricate

a task to replace a battery. Here's the procedure: remove the key completely from the ignition and have it in your pocket or on the workbench, not inside the car! Connect the positive cable first, negative cable next. Then the fault memories in all the systems control units need to be scanned and erased. Several will need to be "re-initialized" or coded. Most often, when a battery goes dead this sets a low voltage or "Under Volt" fault that can scramble the computer's software.

I tend to interchange the terms; ECUs, Control Units, ECMs, and Computers because they can all be PAINS!



Getting Quicker and Smoother by Looking Farther Ahead

Looking far ahead when you drive sounds easy, but it is critical skill that a driver must develop. It is important in any kind of track or racing event, but especially so in autocross, and there are several reasons for this.

First, it can be hard just to be sure where you need to go on an autocross course. On some courses, the "sea of cones" can be intimidating. You have to bring your intended path into focus before you can drive it. Maneuvers that seemed clear when you walked the course can become hard to follow when you arrive at speed.

Secondly, autocross maneuvers demand that you change direction abruptly, as opposed to the smooth higher-speed turns on a racetrack, and you won't have much time between maneuvers to get the car aimed for the next one. You have to leave each maneuver already pointed in the right direction for the next one. That will demand a great memory, or looking ahead to the next maneuver, or both.

Third, if you are looking way ahead and setting up for what is to come, you will naturally be smoother and quicker. It will be easier to have the car in the right place for what is ahead, and at the right speed. The course will start to "flow," as they say. Flow is good.

You may have heard instructors talk about looking where


you want to go, not where you don't want to go. Prevailing wisdom says you will go where you look, so look to the space next to the cone (or tree, or whatever).

I am not really convinced that we are drawn toward whatever we look at, like moths to a flame, but I do think it helps to visualize your path through the course. Picture you and your car slicing through each maneuver and blending them all together.

It is easy to talk about looking ahead, but when you are in the middle of a corner and fighting the car and trying to stay off the cones, it is hard to look past that next threatening cone, right? Well, with time and practice, it gets easier.

When you are going fast, it is hard to do much about the cones that are just beyond your hood. By the time you make inputs to steering, throttle position, and braking, it will be a few car lengths before you can really make much of a correction. So if you can focus on cones that are farther ahead, maybe ten or fifteen car lengths instead of one or two, you stand a better chance of placing the car accurately for them.

Looking ahead to go faster isn't something you just go out and do, it is something that you strive to do, and practice doing. After a while, maybe you will win a trophy for doing it better than your competition!





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

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
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Rennsport Reunion V Does it get any better?



The Suncoast PCA 2015 autocross series continued in October with an entertaining Ladies' Day event at the Tampa Bay Downs in Oldsmar, FL.

The large parking lot on the south side of the horse track was the driving venue and canvas for another artfully designed Mark Lasota course. The clutch-saving soft start gave way to immediate, hard acceleration through the first few gates. A bit of lift or braking was required to turn toward the large carousel, which challenged drivers to maintain speed while staying close to the cones. Exiting the carousel led to a hard right turn where a wide setup paid dividends in exit speed leading into the first pass through a short slalom, then two consecutive turnaround boxes, followed by a second pass through the slalom and across the finish line. Clever use of the space allowed fast speeds to be attained while lengthening the run times and allowing multiple cars to safely drive on the course simultaneously.

Veteran Suncoast Region autocrosser Sharron Shields, fresh off a first-place autocross finish at the Porsche Parade, lent her support by leading a course walk geared toward our lady competitors, providing expert in-car coaching, and supplying prizes to our top lady drivers. Will Reilly and the team from Motorsports by Reeves also sponsored the event, with a fantastic breakfast and beautiful Porsche-themed prizes for our lady competitors. Big thanks go out to Sharron, Will, and Motorsports by Reeves for all that they contribute to autocross and our region!

After the tire squealing abated, Soraya Juarbe-Diaz stood at the top as the fastest veteran lady autocrosser of the day. Tori Lewis and Heather Broadbent were close behind in the



veteran ladies' category. Heather Hamil, daughter of Suncoast regular and multinational champion autocrosser Maury, took home the prize for fastest rookie lady, just ahead of Miel Iles and Terri Grist.

Remembering Mike Joffee

Mike Joffee passed away on September 21, 2015. He was 74 years old and had been a member of PCA and Gold Coast Region for 45 years.

I first met Mike at the 1979 CitrusFest multiregional event in Orlando. I was new to PCA and anxious to make new friends outside Suncoast Region. The folks from Orlando seemed okay, but those "Miami Guys" seemed a little less friendly

than most, especially this Mike Joffee fellow. I subsequently learned that I was completely wrong. Mike became one of my dearest friends.

Back then, Zone 12 had not yet been formed and Florida was still part of Zone 3. Driver's Ed was years away so multiregional events were the big deal. These were all great events, similar to a mini national Parade with a Concours, TSD Rally, Tech Quiz, Autocross, and lots of social stuff. Mike was the perennial Chairman of SonnenFest. He received the prestigious national award of "PCA Enthusiast of the Year" in 1999, recognizing, in part, his long history as SonnenFest Chair.

Somewhere in the late 1990s, Driver's Ed was started on a national basis. PCA in Florida had grown so much that the state became the new Zone 12. As DE became more popular, the classic multi-regional events in Florida started to wane. Eventually, the Zone 12 presidents got together and chose to combine the Suncoast and Gold Coast multi-regionals into the new "ZoneFest." Mike and I became the ZoneFest cochairs and remained so for several years until the interest in attending a competitive multi-event weekend finally dwindled.



Although ZoneFest was brought back a few years ago, it has never been the same.

Mike was always a familiar face at national PCA events, especially at National Parades. As a 45-year PCA member, he rarely missed a National Parade. He always served as both a Concours judge and Protest Committee member including Protest Chair at the 2003 Florida Parade. His level head and thoughtful knowledge of the rules was an enormous asset in resolving the heated protests that sometimes occur at Parade competitive events.

Mike and I were both members of the National Parade Competition Rules (PCR) committee for many years and Mike continued serving until this year. This is the group that writes the national rules which govern all PCA competition events including Concours, Rallies, Tech Quizzes, and Autocross.

The process of writing and maintaining these rules may seem relatively simple, but that is far from the truth. The nuance of the rule book is complex and it seems someone is always trying to find a way to shortcut the intent of the rules. The PCR's as they exist today are largely a product of Mike Joffee's intellect and thoughtfulness.

Mike's expertise in Concours judging went well beyond PCA. He became an invited judge for the prestigious Winter Park Concours d'Elegance in 2004, and was active with the WPC for ten years. Mike's contribution to the Winter Park event will be recognized and honored this year when the 2015 Winter Park Concours Spirit Award will be renamed to the "Mike Joffee Spirit Award."

We all have many friends in the PCA family. Those who knew Mike Joffee were especially blessed. Mike was dedicated to the idea of what a complete car club is all about; he was a "car guy" in the best sense. Not once did I ever see Mike do anything that was not in the best interest of PCA. He could always be counted on to do things right, and everything he did was done with integrity and honor. Mike Joffee will be missed.


Dates remaining for 2015 DE: Nov. 13 to 15

The 48 Hours at Sebring Club Race committee has begun making plans for the 2016 race to be held February 4–7, 2016.

It's time for all Suncoast and Gold Coast members to start planning how they can get involved. It is your opportunity to give back to your region and be involved with the most successful Club Race in PCA and help raise money for region activities and The Ronald McDonald House charity. Start making plans and reservations to make it a weekend of fun and excitement.

Where will you be? What will you be doing? What could you be doing that would possibly equal spending a weekend at world-famous Sebring International Raceway with about 500 Porsches? Talk about a car show: This is the largest Porsche-only racing event in the world—in fact, it is the largest single-marque automobile racing event in the world! How could you miss it, especially when it is almost in your back yard!

Last year's 21st anniversary event was a great success: We had over 450 participating Porsches. Now, as we are starting on our third decade of hosting 48 Hours at Sebring, along with our friends in the Gold Coast Region, the 22nd edition will be even bigger and better. The 48 Hours at Sebring has grown into the largest PCA Club Race in the country. We expect to sign up over 350 racers and Advanced Solo drivers in the first two days of registration. This means we will need volunteers more than ever to help us run this huge event. Why should you care?

If you are a PCA member who has been standing on the sidelines, wanting to become involved, but unsure of actually attending your first event, this is a perfect opportunity to see what PCA is all about, and meet a group of really nice people! You will be asked to work for a few hours at a job that is actually more fun than work; you get a nice T-Shirt, free lunch, and free Friday-night beer and wine party. You also just might meet someone who just won the Daytona 24 Hour Race, or past winners of Daytona 24, Sebring 12 Hour, or Le Mans 24 Hour—or maybe someone who has won them all. For sure you will not find a better gathering of Porsches and Porsche people anywhere.

The Club race raises thousands of dollars for Ronald McDonald House each year and provides the Gold Coast and Suncoast regions funds to support Socials, Drivers' Ed and AutoX programs, and helps local charities.

What can you do to help?

TRACK REGISTRATION: We need 4 or 5 people to assist with getting the drivers checked in; this is an indoor sitting job that begins at 7:00 a.m., on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. The first couple of hours are the busiest, so you need to be a morning person.

THE GRID: We have a lot of people returning from last year to work the grid, but we still need a few more for each day. You need

to be in good shape as it entails a lot of standing and walking. Your primary responsibilities are:

1. Helping get each car in its assigned spot, based on information on a timing sheet provided by Timing & Scoring. 2. Doing a quick check of the car to make sure that it is not dripping any liquids, engine & trunk lids are closed and secured, etc. 3. Checking the driver to ensure that he or she is buckled in, with helmet on and secured.

TIMING AND SCORING: We need about 5 volunteers each day. You will assist the stewards in identifying the cars as they go past the start/finish line to verify that their timing equipment is working properly. You will also assist in the preparation of the timing sheets for distribution to the grid. This is a nice comfortable inside job but it is the heartbeat of the race.

TECH AND SCALES: We need volunteers each day to help check the Advanced Solo group cars for tire pressure, Torque lug nuts, and to check helmets and brake lights. Thursday and Friday are the busiest days for tech. Scales are open Friday through Sunday. The race cars are weighed on the scales to make sure they are the proper weight for their class. Volunteers are needed to push the cars on the scales.

THE CORNERS: We need volunteers to assist the SCCA corner-workers at each corner. This is truly where the action is! Working the corners is a fun and action-packed assignment. Each corner throughout the track is manned by 1–2 professional SCCA corner workers. For each corner, we assign a maximum of 2 volunteers to assist the SCCA corner workers. We have many volunteers who return each year and request a specific corner or corner worker. It's amazing how much you can learn while watching skilled drivers go through a corner lap after lap. There is no better way to get closer to the action unless you are actually driving!!

The responsibilities for the corner are: **1.** You are an extra set of eyes and ears for the SCCA corner worker, helping observe the activities on the track. **2.** In the event of an incident, the corner worker may ask you to hold or wave the appropriate flag. **3.** You may be asked to assist with any reporting of an on-track incident.

NOTES: At no time would you go over the wall! Long pants and closed-toe shoes are required.

Please do not wear colors that would be confused as a flag, for example red or yellow. White or the 48-Hour T-shirt are perfect.

Pit Marshalls: This is a Sunday-only job which starts around 10:00 a.m. with a meeting with the race steward.

This position is needed during the Enduro. Each driver is required to make a 5-minute pit stop during each Enduro. We need at least 12 people to observe the pit stops.

The responsibilities for Pit marshals are: **1.** Observe and report to PCA scrutineer any spilled fuel, etc. **2.** Observe and report any crew member over the wall without proper equipment **3.** Make sure that the maximum number of crew over the wall is not exceeded. **4.** Enforce all rules as instructed by PCA Scrutineers.

NOTES: Long pants and closed-toe shoes are required. Training will be provided by PCA officials.

Traffic Control: This position is needed to control traffic to allow the racers easy access to the grid before each run and back to their assigned area after the run.

MISCELLANEOUS POSITIONS: We need volunteers to help with the Friday- and Saturday-night activities This is where we raise the most money for the charities. We need a few other volunteers to take on whatever task that may come up. To Volunteer go to 48hour-satsebring.com. 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
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
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
