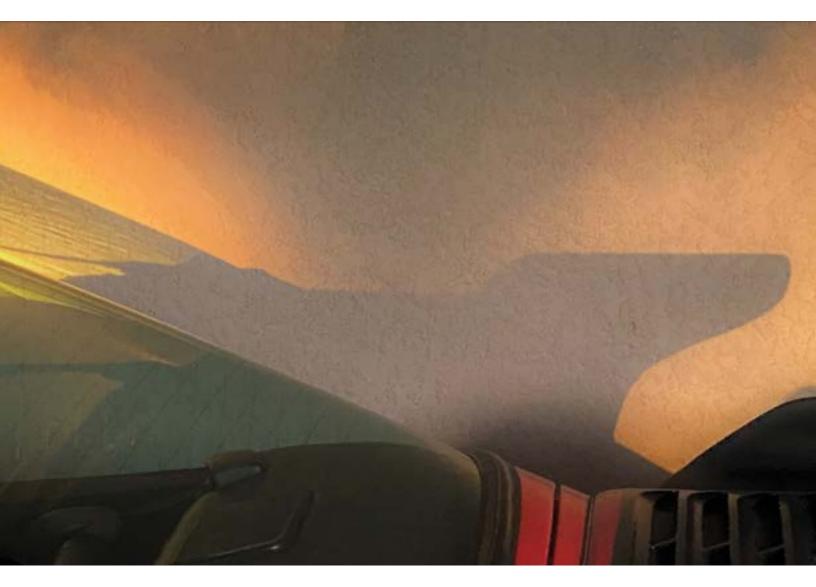


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At The Right Time...

Fast, to the Future!

s we all know, Porsche pulled its Factory • 3 FIA World Endurance Championship ATeam from the IMSA Weathertech Series at the end of 2020. We can thank the Covid-19 Pandemic for that.

At least that was the official reason given, but we all know that they have been preparing to enter the Le Mans Daytona hybrid (LMDh) Prototype class in 2023.

At the end of the 2017 season, Porsche had also pulled out of the LMP1 class of the FIA World Endurance Championship (WEC) and announced that they would start competing in the FIA Formula E (all-

electric open wheel) starting in 2019.

Since it's inception in 1948, Porsche has raced and won a myriad of races and championships all over the globe. They have won, among others:

• 1 Formula One race: 1962 (Dan Gurney's victory in the French Grand Prix driving a Porsche 804).

That was Porsche's first and last F1 race that they won. Hopefully that'll soon change. Note: Porsche did participate and win in F1 as an engine supplier (TAG-Porsche) to McLaren: 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987.

So, for me, being a Formula1 and a Porsche super fan, the recent rumors make me very hopeful for the future.

PORSCHE IS MAKING PREPARATIONS TO ENTER FORMULA 1 IN 2025

We know that Porsche developed (in secret) a Formula 1 engine that targeted the 2021 regulations, but the project was shelved together with the World Endurance Championship program in 2018. We also know that Porsche is in negotiations with Formula 1 to enter the top racing series as a manufacturer in 2025 if F1 agrees to use Porsche's eFuel that promotes sustainability and helps in cost reductions. For their part, F1 has announced a first-ever budget cap of \$145 million per team starting with the 2021 season with spending limits decreased





to \$135 million from 2023 onward (this is exactly what Porsche was looking for).

Although meetings are done "behind closed doors," news has leaked out that Porsche, which is part of FIA's engine working group, is very involved in the development of the 2025 regulations and that they show up to meetings full of ideas. They also want to double the electrification of the racecars by 2025.

Here's the timeline:.

- February 2021 Porsche is invited to attend its first FIA meeting in years
- March 2021 VW Supervisory Board agrees to participate in follow-up meeting which also included AMG Petronas, Alpine Renault, and Ferrari, among others.
- April 2021 Porsche and Audi are expected to join as equal partners to discuss conditions for their participation in F1.
- May 2021 both Porsche and Audi will submit business plans to their respective Boards of Directors and the top brass at Wolfsburg.
- Late Spring or early Summer 2021 a Memorandum can be expected.

Sounds to me like they're all-in! Only questions are:

- Will Porsche constrict itself to being just an engine supplier to other teams such as Red Bull (whose contract with Honda goes only through the end of 2024), McLaren, and/or Williams?
- Will Porsche decide to develop an allinclusive package solution? (Porsche car, Porsche engine, and Porsche Team)
- Will they use their own factory drivers if they develop the whole package, or...
- Will they hire from the F1 alumni? For the Porsche racing fan, the future is looking mighty good!

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Famous American Racecar Driver

very now and then, instead of technical Estuff, I also like writing about personal stories relating to Porsches. This one in particular has just a hint of Porsche content but it mostly relates to my other passions, Formula1, and little karts that go fast and burn gasoline laced with nitro-methane and castor oil, so here it is:

Back in the last century, in the 1990s, in another life, when I was part of the corporate world, I had to travel constantly. One of those trips took me to Brazil, São Paulo to be more precise. I had been to São Paulo multiple times before but I'd never had any free time to see the sights, since my hectic schedule usually was: overnight flight from the US, go to hotel, shower and change, go to long meeting, then to dinner with business host, back to hotel for a few hours of sleep, early morning visit to the plant, wrap up negotiations, back to airport, evening flight and return home. Repeat next week in another country.

On this particular trip we were able to reach our business agreements very quickly and suddenly found ourselves with some free time. My business host asked me if there was anything that I'd like to see or do while in São Paulo and I told him that there were actually two things that I'd love to do.

One was to pay my respects to the greatest racecar driver ever, Ayrton Senna, who had died just the year before, and the other one

to visit the Formula 1 track of Interlagos (Autódromo José Carlos Pace). My host, who was an F1 maniac like 99.9 percent of Brazilians, was all smiles. He told me that it would be a pleasure for him to take me to both places and, as an added bonus, we would take his beautiful Guards Red 944S (this is the extent of the Porsche content).

We chit-chatted a little as we made our way to the Morumbi Cemetery in São Paulo which took about 90 minutes, as we fought through the intense traffic of the largest

metropolis of the Southern Hemisphere. When we arrived, you could hardly tell it was a cemetery. It looked more like a park, since you couldn't see any vertical headstones or monuments. We slowly

> made our way to the big tree in the center of the concentric rows of tombs. each with a small, discreet plaque on the recently mowed grass. Ayrton Senna's

The bronze plaque reads: Ayrton Senna da Silva 21-03-1960 01-05-1994

NADA PODE ME SEPARAR DO AMOR DE DEUS.

Nothing can separate me from the Love of God.

We spent about a half hour there and left without saying a word. It was a moving experience, since Senna had been my all-time favorite racecar driver and I had followed his career very closely. His fatal racing accident was still fresh in my mind since it had happened less than a year before while he was leading the 1994 San Marino Grand Prix at the Autodromo Enzo e Dino Ferrari in Imola, Italy.

After we left the cemetery, we headed south. "Let's go see Autódromo Carlos Pace. It's only about 10 kilometers" (6 miles), my host said, breaking the silence with a cheerful voice. Indeed it was a quick drive but, when we got there, the main entrance was closed! We parked on the side and I walked up to the cyclone fence to try to see the cars that were on the track. I couldn't see the track from there, but I could hear the screaming engines of various 4-cylinder power plants going around the track.

My host had walked to the gate, a few yards away and I could see him talking to someone on the other side. After a short time, he waved me over and said, "Get in the car, we're going in."

I asked him how he had gotten permission and he said, "Oh, I just told the guard that you were a famous American racecar driver visiting Brazil and that you wanted to see the track." continued on page 27

Immediately I jumped in the car, the gate opened, and we drove in. We made our way to the tunnel and to the infield, then to the pits. What I had been hearing was a foursome of Formula 3 cars that were practicing and were now coming into the garages. We got out of the car and walked all around, looking at the cars, equipment, etc.

After about 30 minutes, when we were about to head back to the car, I heard someone call out my name but I didn't react. Pedro is a common Brazilian name so it must be some other Pedro, I thought. "Pedro!" the voice called out again and this time, I turned

around. "I knew it was you!" he said. I can't believe my eyes. There, in front of me, was one of my former rivals from my old karting days. We both had made it twice to the CIK's (Commission Internationale de Karting) Pan-American Championship 25 years earlier. In 1970, I had bested him, finishing in 11th and he in 13th place overall, and two years later he bested me by only 1/10th of a second grabbing 10th place and leaving me out of the final runoff championship race. We looked at each other not knowing what the greeting protocol should be. Do I smack him or shake his hand? I thought to myself. We then just hugged and patted each other in the back...

kind of hard, if I remember correctly. He then asked me, "What are you doing here?" I said, "Just looking. I'm in São Paulo till tomorrow and came by to see the track. What about you?" I asked. He said, "I am coaching some young drivers at the Kartódromo Ayrton Senna, over there, next to the track." Then he said, "You think you still have it in you?" I answered, "Do you have a helmet for me?" He answered, "Let's go and find out! Follow me in your car." He hopped into his golf cart and we followed in the car. We made our way out of the infield and onto the circular access road toward the Karting School's track. There, my old friend had his guys quickly prepare two of the training Karts for us and we went at it.

We did 8-10 laps passing each other several times. This was a much friendlier battle than our previous encounters and I still remember the feeling to this day. It was just wonderful! ... And to top it off, it was at Senna's hometown track, where he had raced his Kart and won many times.

We spent another 45 minutes or so there and we were shown around the compound. After being all caught-up, in our lives, we hugged again, promised to keep in touch, and I headed back to the car with my business host. When we were in the car, just leaving the track, my host turned to me and said: "Wow! I wasn't lying when I told the guard that you were a famous American racecar driver. Who knew?"







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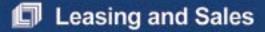






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Suncoast Returns to Sharky's - May 18

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The Budding of a Passion

7ATKINS GLEN,...1948. ${f V}$ Prix racing is introduced to Central New York through the streets of this small village. After the fatality of a youngster and several injuries in 1952, the race was moved to country roads outside of town. In 1956, a high school junior gets summer work on a surveying crew working on Rt. 17 in New York's Southern Tier in the town of Big Flats and lives with his grandmother on Keuka Lake. The construction company for which he works is contracted to build a new road course on 555 acres high above the village to become known simply as THE GLEN. The confluence of these events planted the Porsche seed in the heart of this high school junior.

Fast forward a handful of years to a teaching career, and returning with friends to Keuka Lake each summer to enjoy the thrills of THE GLEN. In 1965 one of these friends, who had also been bitten by the bug, purchased a '65 white 356C. Oh, the envy! Graduate school followed, and while attending Ohio University in 1966, a discovery! A '62 Porsche, owned by a country doctor in Southeastern Ohio, was advertised in a local paper. After some dickering, the 1600 356B T-6 Notchback (body by Karmann) was purchased for \$3600.

It certainly was a step up from the previously owned Karmann Ghia and made the trip back and forth to Long Island and Keuka Lake several times in the 3 years of ownership. Unfortunately, like the Ghia, it became too small to accommodate a growing family and, in 1968, was sold to a woman in Rochester, NY, never to be heard from again.

Children and a career occupied the next 50 years, but always that admiration and longing for another Porsche. In 2017, entering a phase in life where considering one became a reality, the search began. The target was a 911 Cabriolet six speed at plus-or-minus \$30K. Over the course of several months a number were considered, a burgundy/tan '04 in Tallahassee, a grey/ grey '03 in Pompano Beach and, finally, the silver/blue '02 in Tampa with less than 22K miles. Bingo!

It's now been more than 10K miles and 3 years of driving bliss. A year ago, a friend









from the Berkshires, who owns an '09 Cab, suggested I join PCA,...if only to receive Panorama. But it's been so much more,... new friends, fun driving experiences, sharing

of ideas,...and last but not least seeing all the 356s by the lake in Howie-in-the-Hills. Sure makes one lust to own and drive that old air-cooled 1600 again\$\$\$\$!!■

Kart 4 Kids Charity

Walking up to the event registration tables, I hear the hum of the karts racing around the track. It's a beautiful, albeit warm April day, with a light breeze whipping through the racing flags and tents. Silent auction items, including a racing suit and signed bottles of AJ Foyt wines, are set up under a white tent, and racers, spectators, and volunteers mill about as the teams go through their practice runs. The track is smooth, well-groomed, and holds an air of potential and excitement.

The 10th annual Kart 4 Kids Pro-Am Kart Race took place this year at Andersen Race Park in Palmetto, FL on April 10. The race was started in 2012 as a way to honor the memory of IndyCar driver and St. Petersburg resident, Dan Wheldon, who had tragically perished in a racing accident.

This year alone, the event raised \$205,000, their best year yet. In total nearly \$1 million has been raised since the event commenced. These funds have been used for everything from lifesaving equipment purchases, to a Kart 4 Kids Relief Fund to provide support for



patients, families, and staff, to the Kart 4 Kids Concussion Initiative at Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital, which is conducting ground-breaking research on concussions in children.

"Whose lives are we changing? We're changing concussion research for the WORLD," says Dr. Patrick Mularoni of the Kart 4 Kids Concussion Initiative at Johns Hopkins All Children's Hospital. "We are improving outcomes for youth in ways that

we couldn't have imagined a year ago."

Alternatively, you can pack your Porsche, put something liquid greater than 4 fluid ounces in a cooler and hit the road. Not much of a quandary for us. But then again, we're members of PCA and, as Jay Leno once quipped in a YouTube segment featuring his

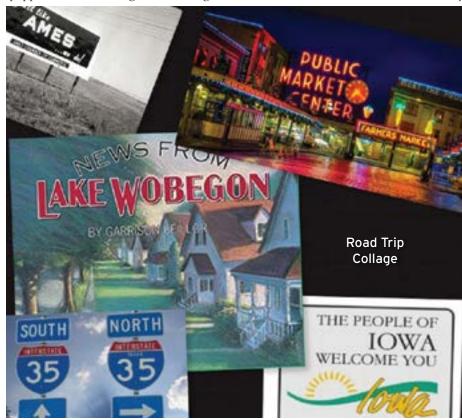

Between trips to the microwave to reheat cup #1 that morning, I thought back to the short 235-milers we took almost twenty years ago for college parents' weekends, and a 2,500 mega miler we hammered out just this past fall to visit that very same student who graduated and scored a real job in Seattle. Obviously, that most recent trip was quite different because driving all day long this past September only got us one quarter of the way there.

Road trips have two components in our book: getting to where you are going; but just as important is the planning and the actual drive itself. A confluence of just being cocooned together, traversing interesting roads, occasionally stunning scenery, and a host of memories to put in the bank. I'm guessing most wouldn't say the same about traveling to the very same location by plane. So, while skimming the articles, I daydreamed a bit about those trips that were poles apart but equally treasured.

When we lived in the Twin Cities, we did at least four parent weekend trips from the Twin Cities to Iowa State in Ames, Iowa, a 235-mile dead straight grind down I-35. Once there, being good parents, we took a hungry college kid out to lunch where most of the restaurant options fit into the category of what students could afford when they were splurging on a date. In other words, although we're not food snobs, fine dining wasn't as they say, "on the menu." Same went for the motel choices which did double duty as the 'go-to' spot for off-campus frat parties. If you have mental images of beer- and wine-stained carpets,



you've been there, too. So, after a couple of overnight efforts, we changed up the routine and did the down and back in a single day. We would get up early on a Saturday, jump onto I-35, meet up with our son, wander the campus, eat at Chili's or Applebee's, bounce around a bit more on campus, and then skedaddle back home. And being honest with ourselves, we knew that college kid was more interested in hanging with his buddies on a Saturday night anyway.

The second leg of that 500-mile day would normally have been a two-hour slog in dwindling light, were it not for NPR and Garrison Keillor's "Prairie Home Companion" broadcast. And since we were Minnesotans and "of a certain generation," it was almost sacrilegious not to tune in. Bisecting hundreds of miles of cornfields heading home on I-35 we laughed out loud at the show and, particularly, his weekly "News from Lake Wobegon" monologue. Along the way, we picked out other Minnesotans, also "of a certain generation," listening to Garrison. They were easy to spot in the adjacent lane because they were laughing at the same time we were.

Fast forward about 16 years, throw in a Pandemic, and suddenly a four-day one-way road trip didn't seem quite so herculean, and you know, it wasn't. We had a blast, other than to take our GPS's advice and go straight into the heart of the beast of downtown Chicago on I-90 on the first



day. But better fortunes shone a couple of hours later, when we got a hundred or so miles into Wisconsin and the sea of 18 wheelers accompanying us all morning evaporated into thin air. Armed with Waze and a Valentine Gen2, we felt pretty comfortable picking up the pace a couple hundred RPMs as we headed toward the western states and their 80-mile-per-hour speed limits. A few hours into day two, we

were happily seeing that very speed limit "banner", and really started to gobble up the miles. Meanwhile, Carol did her best to test her phone's memory capacity by taking a through-the-windshield shot of every one of them. Roadside rest stops were our venue of choice for picnic lunches followed by almost hot take-out dinners and a bottle of wine in our motel room at the end of the day. A combination that we thought was pretty much on par with anything Ames offered up years ago.

After a week or so on the west coast, which included the requisite social visit to the Porsche dealer in Bellevue, we retraced our steps. The scenery was just as beautiful heading in the opposite direction and we let Apple Car play and Sirius radio continue to entertain us until we got home four days later.

And this year? We're already teeing up short-day trips, weekenders, and a couple of multi-day adventures starting with the Parade in French Lick. In the fall, we hope to register for the Treffen at the Kohler estate in Wisconsin. And who knows, after the event, maybe just press on west for another few days where going a touch over 80 is just fine even if you are seen as being "of a certain generation."

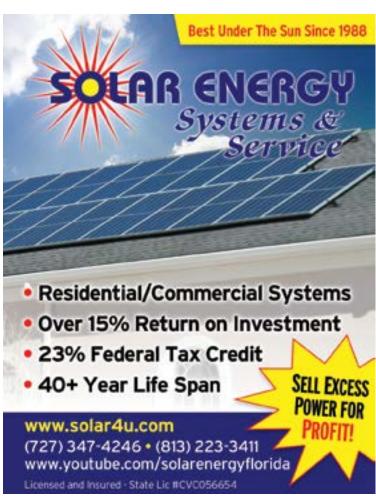
















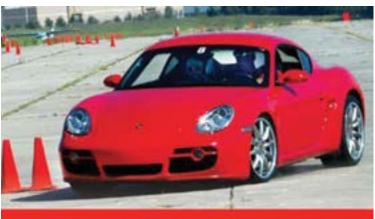

How Will We Fuel Our Classic Porsches in 2035?

T received the following from my I friend Casey Annis, Publisher/Editor Vintage Racecar.

"There's been a lot of nervous talk in the classic car community about the rapid development of electric cars and its potential impact on the future of our classics. While many have predicted doom and gloom, there was some positive news recently coming from Porsche.

When Porsche unveiled their new 911 GT3 Cup car, they also revealed that they have been developing a new synthetic fuel that the GT3 will race on. Now what is fascinating about this new fuel-and good news for the classic car community—is that this synthetic fuel is not petroleumbased (it's made from carbon dioxide

and hydrogen), can run in any gasolinepowered car and will yield a total carbon footprint comparable to electric vehicles. According to Porsche, "Synthetic fuel is cleaner and there is no byproduct, and when we start full production, we expect a CO2 reduction of 85 percent. From a 'well-to-wheel' perspective—and you have to consider the well-to-wheel impact of all vehicles-this will be the same level of CO2 produced in the manufacture and use of an electric vehicle."

So if you were fearful that at some point in time in the near future the well was going to run dry for your classic, fear not...Porsche may have you covered." - -Vintage Racecar

Let's look at what Porsche AG. Has to report. Here is the Press Release from the Porsche Newsroom:

Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup focuses on renewable fuels.

STUTTGART- When the 2021 Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup season kicks off, the championship commits to lower-carbon fuels: As a first step, the international onemake cup will use advanced biofuels and eFuels that have the potential to reduce CO2 emissions significantly. Porsche and ExxonMobil are teaming up to use this beacon-project to test the viability of renewable liquid fuels under tough motor racing conditions. The new Porsche 911 GT3 Cup with its high-revving highperformance flat-six engine serves as the perfect test laboratory for the Esso Renewable Racing Fuels: The car's ca. 375 kW (510 PS) (503 hp) four-litre power unit has been tested to run on renewable fuels. The goal is to gain valuable experiences to find pathways toward potential future consumer adoption.

The Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup races are held as support events at eight European rounds of the FIA FORMULA 1 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP. Porsche and ExxonMobil are implementing a two-stage strategy in the testing of renewable fuels with the potential to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. In 2021, the drivers continued on page 43

contesting the Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup will tackle this season's eight races with a blending of bio-based fuel. This advanced bio-fuel is obtained from food waste products. Additional components are blended in to enable the required fuel properties and combustion behavior.

An octane rating of approximately 98 will be achieved.

The next step is expected during 2022 with the introduction of an eFuel sourced from the new Haru Oni pilot project in Chile that generates hydrogen, which is then combined with captured carbon dioxide drawn from the atmosphere to produce methanol. This eFuel is anticipated

to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by up to 85 percent, when blended to current market fuel standards for today's passenger vehicles. In this pilot project, Porsche and ExxonMobil are working with other international partners to advance the development and potential future commercial viability of synthetic fuels. "The

testing of new technologies in racing has a decades-long tradition at Porsche.

We're proud to be able to assume a pioneering role for Porsche on the critical topic of eFuels," affirms Oliver Schwab, Project Manager Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup. "The Supercup is the first international

racing series to use renewable fuels. Given that our races are held as part of the FIA Formula 1 World Championship, we're very much in the eye of the media, the public and other manufacturers involved in motor racing. As a pioneer in the use of synthetic fuel in Porsche race cars, the Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup takes on an

important communication function for the significance of eFuels at Porsche."

Porsche and ExxonMobil carried out initial fuel tests and gleaned information back at the beginning of 2019. Early in 2020, engine tests were conducted on test benches as well as material compatibility

experiments with fuel-system components and functional trials under a wide range of driving conditions. Racing fuel must also meet the special regulation requirements. Porsche and ExxonMobil have worked together to develop the chemical, physical and technical specifications of the Esso Renewable Racing Fuel with this in mind. ExxonMobil also undertakes the final blending of the ready-to-race fuel. The Esso Renewable

Racing Fuel will be used in all races of the 2021 Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup including the first roll-out at Zandvoort in the Netherlands and the two pretest days held at Monza, Italy. A software update was applied to co-optimize engine and fuel performance. Thus, the engine output of the new 911 GT3 Cup racing car remains unaffected.



Autocross Returns to Venice Airport

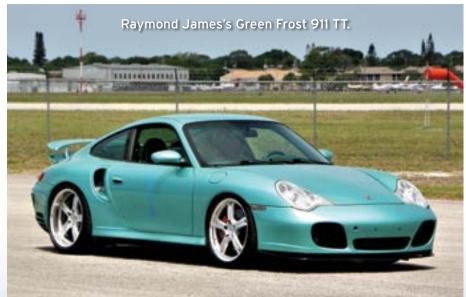

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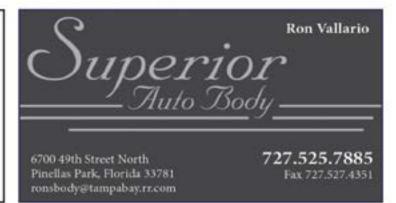

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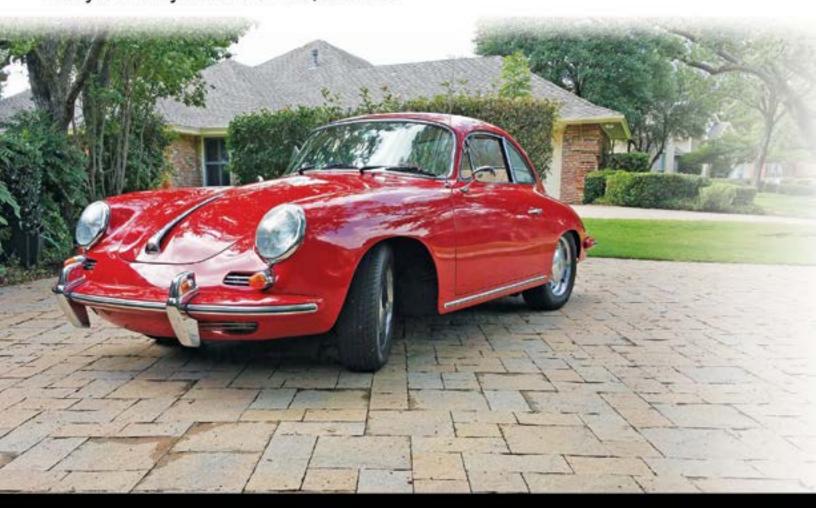
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
